Introduction to India

Intro: The seventh largest country in the world, and the second most populous, economic reforms since 1991 have turned India's economy into one of the fastest growing.

Growing at more than 7% per year since 1997, India was the 11th largest economy in the world by 2009 (and the fourth largest in PPP terms). Cautious banking policies and a relatively low dependence on exports for growth meant India escaped the brunt of the GFC and achieved the second highest GDP growth among major economies in 2009 (6.5%.)

Economy: India's diverse economy encompasses traditional village farming, modern agriculture, a wide range of modern industries, and a multitude of services.

Business: Despite bureaucracy, poor infrastructure, and widespread corruption, there are many Indian companies which are household names on a global scale. We will meet local and global businesses and get hear about challenges and opportunities of doing business in India.

Investment: India's investment landscape (e.g. agriculture, textiles, steel, telecommunications, chemicals, food processing, and software) is very diverse.

Society: India has a rich political history as it is the world's largest democracy. India has the largest concentration of poor people in the world.



Introduction to Mumbai (Bombay)

Mumbai, formerly known as Bombay, is the capital of the Indian state of Maharashtra. It is the most populous city in India and the fourth most populous city in the world, with a total metropolitan area population of approximately 20.5 million. Mumbai lies on the west coast of India and has a deep natural harbour. Mumbai is also the richest city in India, and has the highest GDP of any city in South, West or Central Asia.

Mumbai offers a cosmopolitan and diverse lifestyle with a variety of food, entertainment and night life, available in a form and abundance comparable to that in other world capitals. Mumbai's history as a major trading centre has led to a diverse range of cultures, religions and cuisines coexisting in the city. This unique blend of cultures is due to the migration of people from all over India since the British period.

Things to See in Mumbai:

- Southern Mumbai
 - Oldest part of the city (financial centre)
 - Gateway of India @ Wellington Pier
 - Taj Mahal Hotel @ PJ Ramchandani Marg.
 - Colaba Causeway (shopping street with lots of cafés, paan shops, cinemas etc.)
 - Crawford Market (bazaar)
 - University of Mumbai @ Rajabai Clock Tower
 - Malabar Hill (exclusive neighbourhood)
- Northern Mumbai
 - Newer part of the city (incl. Bollywood with huge slum areas)
 - Bollywood (several studios on different locations)

Good Advices – Business India

1. The Strength of Affiliation/Belonging

In a meeting with Indian people, you should enhance the affiliation to family, acquaintances, business relations, network to Indians and foreigners, and public/governmental institutions.

2. Networking

An Indian business person has widely broadened-out networks – and the network is pivotal to Indians. To please an Indian business relation, discuss about family and friends

3. Hierarchy and Decision-Making

The Indian Company-Family Hierarchy should be respected – it is crucial to Indians. Employees rise each time the boss enters the room.

Supervisors are called "Sir", "Madam" or "Ji" (never by name).

First, approach the senior-most person in an organization, even though you are delegated the work requested.

To show respect, you may suffix "Ji" to the name of a person (even if it is not your boss). "My boss is always right"-attitude.

4. Time and Decision-Making

Delays are universal phenomena in India – and impatience is viewed as impolite.

Punctuality is appreciated, but not strictly adhered to.

When presenting proposals for business counterparts, consider making it as easily digested as possible.

Workday: 9am to 5pm (Monday to Saturday)

Inter-business matters: dealt with from 11am to 4pm.

5. Being Transparent But Not Naive

Indians are per definition suspicious towards counterparts.

Try to be direct (but polite!) and transparent/honest (not naive).

A "yes" that means "no" does not mean lack of honesty (respect)

6. Business Dinners

Do not decline any food, drink or appetizer offered

Be prepared to pay the lunch bill, if required



Etiquette/How to Behave

- When in Rome... Try to do as the people around you – and when in doubt, ask the locals.
- Take off your shoes indoor (especially in temples).
- Right hand is for:
 - Eating, Shaking Hands, Accept Gifts etc.
- Left hand is for:
 - Your behind, taking off your shoes etc.
- Never yell at people
- Ignore beggars (otherwise, you'll attract more of them)
- Do not take a "yes" for a "yes" – it can be a polite "no".
- Not advisable to handshake with women (nod or smile instead)
- Don't look at the women's eyes
- In a group, greet the eldest one in the crowd
- Don't start unwrapping gifts in public

The fifth and last place we will see in Jaipur is Jantar Mantar, which is an Indian star observatory

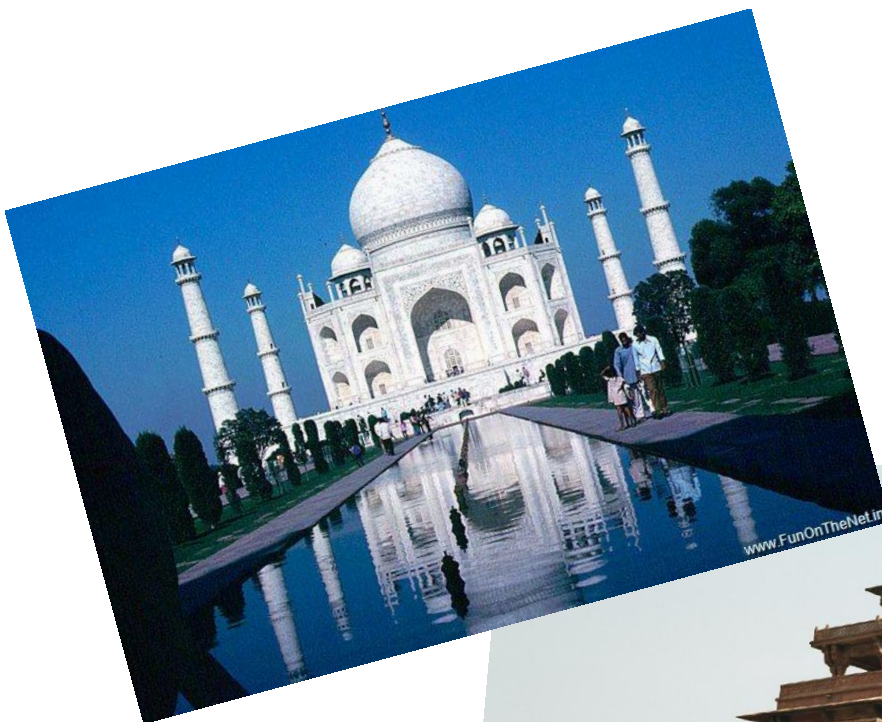


Golden Triangle Trip

In Agra we will see one of the world's seven wonders, Taj Mahal. We will see Taj Mahal either at sunrise or sunset.

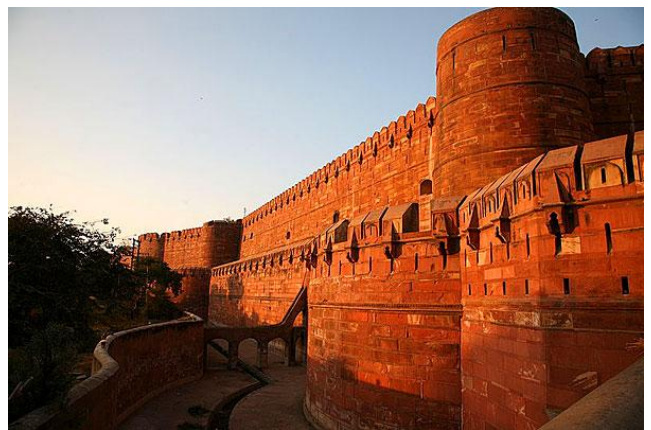
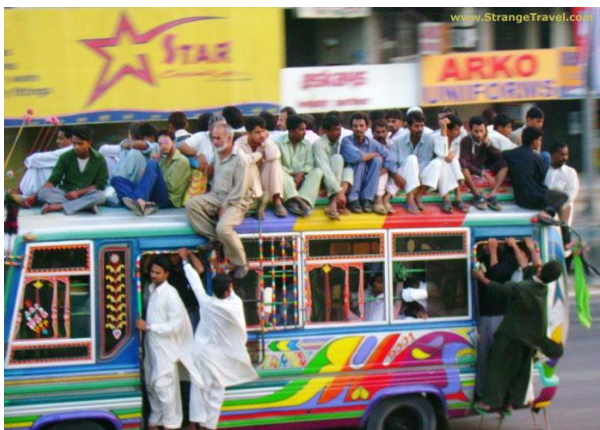


Golden Triangle Trip
